Thank you to all the families who participated in the Languages Week quiz and many congratulations to the Busby family who won! **Mrs Lutz**






Latin students travel back in time to Roman St Albans Over the summer, twelve Latin students from Beaumont went on a lively trip to Verulamium Museum. Together with Latin students from Verulam, STAGS and Parmiter's they explored what life was like in St Albans 2,000 years ago. They dressed in togas and took part in a dinner party and also starred in the entertainment - a real Roman comedy.

Museum staff encouraged them to handle pottery originally used in a Roman kitchen and replicas of armour used by Roman soldiers. They also saw the Roman inscription that shows when the basilica (town hall) was being built in Verulamium, and links St Albans into the history books of the Roman Empire.

Read & Write

We are delighted to be able to offer our students access to Read & Write at home. This package has a number of features to aid learning but the main ones are outlined below:

- A computer reader students can put in headphones, select the text and listen to the text rather than read it. This facility will also allow them to listen back to their own work, which can help a lot with the proofreading process.
- A fact finder a fantastic research tool which allows students to highlight key words and phrases in different colours and then have them organised into a categorised list. In short an online highlighter!
- A fact mapper students can create mind maps online, which will also allow them to use the dictionary and thesaurus within the programme to help. Images can also be added to the mind map to aid memory and understanding. This can be a great way to create revision resources on a computer.
- A key word list creator this facility called 'word cloud' allows you to collate the key words from a text so that you can focus on learning them. As well as creating them from your own work, there are various topics pre-loaded into the software e.g. 'A Christmas Carol' in books or the American Civil War for History.

Learning to use the features of the Read & Write toolbar does take time but it is worth it for the increased independence it offers. Tutor time sessions for every year group from Year 7-13 were run last year so that all of our students can access the software and use it effectively. Year 7 will have a tutor time session devoted to using the Read and Write software during this academic year. Please look out for an upcoming email with details of how to download the software and get Read and Write Gold set-up for use.

New this year: I am planning to run a Parent Information Evening on how to make the best use of this software. When you receive the parent email there will be a link to sign up for the Information Evening and details of date and location.

If the event is over-subscribed, preference will be given to those in Key Stage 4 and above who need to use a reader or computer reader for their external exams. Depending on levels of demand, I will run another training event later in the year again. **Mrs Dine**

Award-winning Authors connect students to reading
