




## **Second Hand Uniform**

#### **Holocaust Memorial Assembly**

In advance of Holocaust Memorial Day at the end of January, I gave an emotional assembly to Years 8-12, recounting the story of my grandfather's escape from Nazi Germany, and that of the British man responsible for saving him, Frank Foley. A memorial has recently been unveiled to Frank Foley, who was a British spy in 1930s Berlin, who used his position to create false papers to allow about 10,000 Jewish Germans to leave the country illegally. One of the families he helped was that of my grandfather, his brother and his parents. I hoped to get students to think about the personal stories behind the huge numbers affected by the Holocaust, but also of the unintended consequences - that I am here teaching Maths to our students is only possible because of a largely unknown brave British man called Frank Foley and his actions almost a hundred years ago. As it says on his memorial, "He who saves one, saves the world".

# Writer Tom Pollock introduces White Rabbit, Red Wolf and discusses mental health

At the end of last term, writer Tom Pollock visited Beaumont to talk to Year 9 about his young adult thriller *White Rabbit, Red Wolf*. Tom told the students that the book contains 'murder, maths, mental health, family, secrets and spies' but is, at its core, a story about fear. The White Rabbit of the title is Peter Blankman, a brilliant, teenage mathematician who suffers from debilitating panic attacks and paranoia. When someone attempts to assassinate his mother, a government scientist, Peter unearths a deep and chilling conspiracy which he must investigate and expose while grappling with his own fears.

Having introduced the story and read a gripping excerpt from the opening pages, Tom went on to explain that he wrote Peter Blankman's character because he himself has a mental health condition. Tom spoke with great honesty about his own fears and panic attacks, explaining that he created Peter in order to convey what he has gone through himself. He hopes that this will resonate with others who are suffering with mental health issues and give them the sense that they are understood and are being spoken for.

Research has shown that reading fiction improves empathy. Tom echoed this by describing reading as 'taking a holiday in someone else's brain'. He stressed the importance of writing and talking openly about mental health issues in order to encourage greater discussion and understanding. Tom explained that those suffering should feel able to share, as reaching out and feeling supported is crucial to improving mental health.

Year 9 listened intently and greatly enjoyed Tom's talk. Many students then joined us in the library to meet Tom and buy their own, signed copy of *White Rabbit, Red Wolf.* Here is a taste of what the students said about Tom's visit.


