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Geography Year 7 Curriculum Enrichment Day

On Thursday 21 September Year 7 students ventured out on their first school trip to the River Lea in Wheathampstead. Fortunately, the weather held out enabling the students to make full use of their time at the river and busy themselves collecting measurements.

They took a number of different measurements including using a dog biscuit to measure the speed of the river. The students learnt to read angles using clinometers and take pebble measurements using callipers with much of the fieldwork equipment having been kindly donated by the BSA. The students appeared to have a great time in the river with plenty of very wet feet and full wellies. What the students had to say about their first Geography field trip...

"On CED day the Year 7s went to the River Lea. We went there to get information to decide if it was the upper, middle or lower course of the river. The information we collected was: pebble size, depth, speed, wetted perimeter and width. Then in Geography we drew graphs to show our results. To get this information we used different techniques."

"On CED day Year 7 went to the River Lea. Mr Osborne told us that the River Lea is very long and it goes around the Olympic Stadium in London. We had a task to measure the depth and width of the river in different places. We also had to measure the time it took for a rock to flow with the river for ten metres and the longest length of rocks that we took out the river. We had to measure the gradient with a clinometer. We learnt that the river flows through Wheathampstead, WGC, Ware, Broxbourne, Enfield and Stratford. The source of the River Lea is a little hole filled with water and the mouth of the river is a flow into the River Thames." Rita Saporenkova (7E)
