

Dear Mrs Mair

We are writing to you as students of Beaumont School to express our fear and concern regarding the climate crisis and our government's lack of drastic action. During the current political turmoil, we feel that the biggest issue that we have ever faced - the climate crisis - is being ignored; the 2050 zero emissions target is simply too late to prevent mass migration, death, and food shortage, the most drastic consequences of our inaction on the climate crisis.

As students, it is our lives which will be the most affected by the climate crisis. It is the most pressing issue the human race has ever faced. Currently, in less well-off areas around the world, people are experiencing the horrific consequences of climate change: fires, droughts, floods, extreme storms, and rising sea levels to name a few. In Mozambique, more than 1300 people died in March 2019 in one of the worst tropical storms ever seen, one of seven tropical storms this year - more than double the average. There is absolutely no doubt that when there is a tropical cyclone like this, then because of climate change the rainfall intensities are higher. In Europe, the 20 hottest years on record were within the last 20 years. We are experiencing the sixth mass extinction of species around the globe. In the last ten years. 40% of insect species and 22% of mammal species have disappeared.

These are just some of the reasons that we ask you to please think of our future when you cast your vote as our MP. Previously, you have voted against many measures to prevent climate change (such as voting against setting a decarbonisation target for the UK within six months of June 2016 and voting against requiring the UK Green Investment Bank to explicitly act in support of the target of reducing UK carbon emissions). We ask you to vote in favour of the environment, of reducing emissions, of improving public transport, and of new green jobs. We hope you understand how incredibly urgent this is.



Cross Country League Championship and Nationals Round up

We have had another very successful cross country season so far at both District and County level. We had around 40 runners competing each week from Year 7 to Year 13.

In the District League, the Junior Boys team (Years 7 & 8) finished second with the Inter Girls team (Years 9 & 10) going one better and winning their league. Sarah McGrath (10N) was our most consistent performer, finishing in the top two in every race.

In the senior age group Thomas Cooper (Year 12) was third overall in the boys' league whilst Year 12's Bea Towers was second and Niamh Gallagher first in the girls' competition.

At the District Championships at Westminster Lodge on Thursday 10 October, the Junior Boys' team won the team event with Sean Gallagher (8S) finishing third, George Smith (8S) fifth, Tom Flower (8A) sixth and Max Whelan (8B) eighth.

Jessie Nelson (7A) was our most consistent junior girl runner and continued this trend with a twelfth place finish. Team captain Tara Barker (8R) was one place behind Jessie and captained the team extremely well throughout the season.

Sarah continued her excellent form in the Inter Girls race, finishing second with Niamh and Bea finishing second and third respectively in the Senior Girls' race.

At the County Round for the National Cup competition all three teams entered ran extremely well. The Junior Girls' team were fifth out of eight teams whilst the Junior Boys' finished third out of ten teams. Sean Gallagher ran brilliantly, winning his race.

The Junior Boys', Girls' and Inter Girls' teams ran the County Round of the Nationals on Tuesday 8 October. The Inter Girls' team finished second out of eight teams with Sarah once again our top finisher in second, whilst Sai Fisher (9N), Mia Pullan (10L) and Meeka Nightingale (9N) were our other scoring runners.

We are waiting on the results of other races run over the next week to see if the Junior Boys and Inter Girls have qualified for the Regional Final.

A special mention needs to go to Niamh Gallagher and Thomas Cooper, our Cross Country Captains, who have been running cross country training sessions on a Monday after school. It has been great to see over 20 runners attending these sessions regularly and this has had a positive effect on our runners' performances. Well done to everyone who has competed so far this season.
