Welcome back to all the students, staff, new staff and the new Year 7. The term is well underway now with a very positive start, the superb examination results over the summer providing a springboard for us to start from. There were lots of smiling faces on 15 August 2019 when our Year 13 students received their results where, again, many records were broken or equalled. 68% of A Level grades were A*-B and the average grade achieved by our students was a B, equalling the stunning result from last year. Over 90% of students who had applied to university got into either their first or second choice, 57% going to a Russell Group university. A week later the GCSE results were also outstanding. The Attainment 8 score of 60 is a fantastic achievement and we estimate the Progress 8 score to be 0.62, which means that students at Beaumont achieved more than half a grade higher than expected across their subjects. Both sets of these results have led to our biggest Sixth Form on record with a total of 395 students now studying at Key Stage 5.

It was a pleasure to welcome the new Year 7 students and their families at the BSA summer BBQ on Saturday 14 September. The first Curriculum Enrichment Day of the year was a real success with many varied and interesting activities for each year group. I attended a hard-hitting but very effective 'Learn to Live' session with Year 12 on the responsibilities of driving. When I returned to school, I immediately saw some of the Year 9 students scaling a climbing wall on the school field, whereas, Year 11 were working hard on their 'Walking Talking' GCSE English exam practice.

It remains for me to wish all our students a happy and successful year ahead.

Alban Federation

Beaumont School is a member of the Alban Federation partnership in the area of teacher training. Each year the Federation trains a large number of adults (56 in 2019/20), either straight from university with their degrees, or people who are changing careers, and places them in a host school for the year to enable them to complete their training and gain Qualified Teacher Status. applications are submitted through UCAS (the University Admission System) and this year, the application window is scheduled to open on 8th October 2019, for courses starting in September 2020. Courses are in both Primary available and Secondary programmes, with salaries or bursaries available for suitably qualified candidates in many subjects.

If you are interested in becoming a teacher and would like to find out more about how to apply and what is involved, we are holding an **Open Morning on Saturday 12 October 2019** in the Sixth Form Centre at Sandringham School in St Albans. It runs from 9.30am to midday and you are more than welcome to come along and meet current trainees, senior school staff and federation team members. Year 7s, we need you! Introducing Book Club and the St Albans Schools Book Award

Beaumont School is a proud participant in the St Albans Schools Book Award (SASBA) which is heading into its third year. The award was established in 2017 by a number of St Albans schools, including Beaumont, and is targeted at Year 7 students. Each year we confer and produce a shortlist of three fiction titles.

Students who wish to take part and 'shadow' the award are asked to read all three books and to choose which one they would like to win the coveted award. We support the award with a range of activities, including a design-a-bookmark and a mini book review competition. Here are the books on the shortlist for the St Albans Schools Book Award 2019:

The award process culminates in a fantastic discussion day and awards ceremony which is held at St Columba's College.







On this day, students from all the participating schools get together to discuss the shortlisted books and to vote for the eventual winner. This is always a great day out for the students as the author of each book takes part in the awards ceremony in some way. This year's discussion day will take place on 12 December. In order to join us at St Columba's, Year 7 students will need to have read all three books in the running for the SASBA award.

Every Wednesday lunchtime, Head Librarian Mrs Mayer-Khan runs the Year 7 Book Club. During these sessions, students get together to talk about and share their thoughts on what they're reading and anything else book-related! Over the coming weeks the Book Club will also be reading and discussing the three books on the SASBA shortlist. If any Year 7s are unable to attend Wednesday's Book Club meetings but would like to participate in the award, they are still very welcome to take part. For more information on Year 7 Book Club and the SASBA, students can just pop into the library and speak to the librarians.

As well as being lots of fun, book clubs and book awards are an excellent way to nurture an interest in books and to encourage reading for pleasure. Discussing books helps students to learn how to interact with others, to think analytically and to articulate and share ideas. Reading fiction has also been shown to improve empathy and to develop emotional intelligence. We look forward to welcoming Year 7s to Book Club and to sharing the SASBA with them!
