# **Zero Poverty Youth Forum**

On Thursday 24 October, Beaumont and Sir John Lawes Schools delivered a Zero Poverty Youth Forum to students from their own schools as well as students from St Albans Girls' and Sandringham Schools. Hosted by Beaumont, during the morning all attendees were welcomed by John McLaverty, Education and Youth coordinator for Oxfam GB, with a motivating presentation about the importance of students taking action to make change in their world.

Students from Beaumont and Sir John Lawes led workshops that covered topics such as: issues of global inequality, the link between poverty and climate change and how to solve issues of poverty in the local area. In the afternoon John McLaverty was joined by Daisy Cooper, the St Albans Liberal Democrat Parliamentary candidate and Peter Cashman from Christian Aid. They took part in a Question Time style debate hosted by Beaumont Year 13 Government and Politics student, Finlay Craigmyle, accepting challenging and thought provoking questions from the students.

### **Senior Maths Challenge**

As part of the Mathematics Gifted and Talented programme at Beaumont students can take part in the Maths Challenge competition, which consists of individual and group rounds at the junior, intermediate and senior level.

This is a very prestigious nationwide competition in which many schools are involved. On 21 November Beaumont took part in the Hertfordshire section of the Senior Maths Challenge group round, which consists of four mathematicians who have to work as a team in attempting to supply answers to difficult maths problems, working against the clock.

The Hertfordshire section of the Maths Challenge is very competitive; in fact, in one past competition we were told that if we had been competing in a round in any other county we would have won. I am very pleased to announce that this year we achieved our best ever placing by coming in third; Parmiter's School were the winners and Harrow School were second.

The team consisted of Rujun Feng and Theo Mitrache in Year 13 and Charlie Bolam and Joe Marlow in Year 12; they are all excellent mathematicians who I know will go on to achieve great success in their future enterprises.

# **GCSE Presentation Evening**


