	Unit 3: Synoptic themes	1hr 45min exam - 20%	The paper is based on different geographical issues each year. The paper challenges the student's analytical skills and engages the student in the wider reaching and more interdependent geographical themes.
	Unit 4: Course work – Independent Investigation	Non Examined Assessment - 20%	A written empirical research piece within an area of interest chosen by the student. The students define their own hypothesis, and conduct independent data collection with guidance from the teachers. Using both quantitative and qualitative techniques this piece of coursework builds an excellent basis and understanding to develop further at university level.

Fieldwork Visits

The department runs two residential fieldtrips during sixth form. The first trip is designed to engage students in the fieldwork and subsequent independent investigation. The students will learn data collection skills and sample a variety of techniques during the trip. The trip runs in February for three days costing approximately £150. The second trip is an optional 'awe and wonder' style trip. In recent years we have visited Iceland and Sicily.

Preferred Qualities and Qualifications

Beaumont Geographers need to be enthusiastic about the subject and have a real interest in the world around them. You need to be prepared to research and discuss complex ideas in lessons, incorporating your wider understanding of the world. The fieldwork element requires a self-starter who is motivated and capable of working independently. Literacy skills are important to assist in structuring the longer and more discursive written answers.

Future Pathways

We have a significant number of students who go on to study Geography at university each year. Amongst those who took this path over the last two years, students went to Birmingham University, Sheffield University, Exeter University and Leeds University. Others students have successfully applied for Geography related degrees, such as, International Development, Urban Planning and Geology. Geography is a broad subject which has been identified by the Russell Group of universities as a 'facilitating subject' which may lead to you having a much wider choice of options when applying for university.
