From the Board of Trustees - April 2021

We were delighted that students were able to return to school last month, following the end of the latest period of lockdown. The gradual relaxation of rules has meant that it is beginning to feel that the school is getting 'back to normal'. It is certainly wonderful to see extra-curricular groups meeting, more students using the specialist facilities, and a general buzz returning to the school site. Thank you, as always, to the staff for all they have done to keep students safe at this time, and for continuing to go above and beyond for the sake of the school community.

As a result of changes in the rules relating to academy governance, we have restructured governance for the first time since we created the Beaumont School Academy Trust in 2012. We now have an independent group of **Members**, whose job it is to oversee governance, whilst delegating strategic management to the Trustees. Sitting below the Members is the **Board of Trustees**, which is mostly made up of members of what was the Governing Body. We hope that the new structure (which is required by law) will actually allow some greater flexibility in seeking to diversify governance at Beaumont and bring in new Trustees with a broader variety of backgrounds, experience and skills.

We are thrilled to have appointed a very distinguished group of five Members: Louise Hardy (a former pupil and eminent engineer, who was Infrastructure Director for the design and construction of the 2012 Olympic Park); Elizabeth Hitch (Headteacher of Beaumont School from 2004 to 2017 and a former Ofsted inspector); John McAlister (a parent, former governor and management consultant); Lionel Wallace (a former pupil, aeronautical engineer, and this year's High Sheriff of Hertfordshire); and Professor Matthew Weait (Deputy Vice-Chancellor of the University of Hertfordshire, barrister and bencher of Middle Temple). All of these individuals have connections to Beaumont and/or education in Hertfordshire, and I know they will bring huge added value and vigour to governance at the school.

The Board of Trustees continues to meet virtually, as we have done since March 2020. We are all very keen to visit the school at the first possible opportunity and hope to be in a position to attend school for a strategy meeting before the end of the Summer Term. Alex Hall, Chair of Trustees
