
My piece (below) is a Japanese inspired teapot, cup and macaroon; it was made for the Year 10 sweets and treats project, using embroidery, applique, reverse applique and fabric manipulation. It was developed after researching a wide range of artists' techniques. I choose my fabrics carefully to mimic the Japanese style and their love of matcha.

My textile piece (left) is a 3D felted head of a Victorian woman who is wearing a bonnet with various cakes and sweets along the sides. My theme was sweet treats and I was inspired by the colours and cakes typically associated with Victorian tea parties. I created this piece by needle felting into a polystyrene head and building the felt up in areas to readjust the proportions. I also used pulled apart yarn to give the hair texture. I next created the bonnet out of various pieces of cardboard and by manipulating an old hat and then covered it in fabric. I pleated some lace to go around the rim of the bonnet and sewed in some fabric flowers after sewing in a trim. I then fabric painted appliques of cakes and sweets for the bonnet which I embellished with pearls.

The theme for my embroidery hoop (above right) was the ocean. I was inspired by the many organic shapes, colours and patterns in the sea. The three main circles are inspired by sea urchins and the folded fabric and lace are based on seaweed and coral. I used a range of materials including lace, synthetic and man-made fabrics. I embroidered into the lace and other areas and used a heat gun on some of the 3D elements; I used fabric paint to create the bold colours found in the ocean.

From the Trustees

Trustees on the Community, Teaching and Learning (CTL) Committee have two meetings each term. At our meeting in February we discussed a Pupil Premium report regarding progress and attainment. From the report we heard about the wide range of support being provided to students including pastoral interventions, where required, and how Covid-19 catch-up funding is being used for additional provision such as small group tuition.

Department reviews take place every two years to monitor the effectiveness of the curriculum and the CTL Committee oversees the effectiveness of the curriculum. Trustees play a role in these reviews, which typically involve the link trustee for the department. An important component of the review process is talking to students and trustees value the feedback we get from them which informs our discussions and planning. Trustees also spent time in school attending lessons with students on 24 February.

In response to the disruption caused by the pandemic, exam boards published information prior to the February half term about the content of this summer's exams being undertaken by students in Years 11 and 13. Teachers are informing students of areas they need to focus on as well as if there are any topics they do not need to revise.

Trustees would like to thank students, parents, carers and school staff for their continuing hard work and commitment.

#### Lego League

On Saturday 29 January, two Beaumont teams (one in Year 9 and one in Year 10) went to the First Lego League regional final competition in Stevenage. The competition entails coding a robot to complete Lego challenges and creating a solution to a given problem (this year's problem being to improve cargo transport).

Throughout the day, we got to practise and complete our robot runs and present our innovation projects to the judges. Both teams achieved 245 points in the robot run - making them joint top scorers, before facing each other in a friendly head-to-head later in the day, which the Year 9 team won.

For the innovation project, each team presented their idea to make cargo transportation better. The Year 9 team's idea was the WHOIL - a submarine shaped like a whale that goes underwater to collect oil from oil spills. The Year 10 team's idea was E-Trainsit - a train which puts down its own tracks to deliver resources to communities in third world countries, while cutting emissions and costs.

During the awards ceremony, the Year 9 team received the robot trophy and the innovation project trophy while the Year 10 team won overall and will progress to the national finals in Harrogate taking place on Saturday 26 February.

## Thriller writer M.A. Bennett joins the Beaumont Book Awards celebrations

The Beaumont Book Awards (BBA) reached a fabulous finale in February with the Library packed to the bookshelves for the all-important final vote and celebration party. The event was made extra special by a visit from Marina Bennett, author of the S.T.A.G.S. series of young adult books.

The BBA is a student-led initiative featuring both a Younger Readers and an Older Readers category. It has been immensely popular this year with 50 students from across Years 7-10 taking part and undertaking to read all five of the shortlisted books in their category. At the closing event, students took turns pitching the books they wanted to win the awards, trying to persuade others to vote for their particular favourite. After a series of impressive pitches, students cast their votes to decide the winners.

Marina Bennett joined the event to listen to the students' book presentations and also had the honour of announcing the winning titles. Voting was tight in both categories, with a tie for first place in the Younger Readers section!

Younger Readers category, joint winners: The List of Things That Will Not Change by Rebecca Stead, Echo Mountain by Lauren Wolk. Older Readers category, winner: The Inheritance Games by Jennifer Lynn Barnes.

To round off the BBA book fest, Marina talked to the students about her journey to becoming a writer and the events that inspired S.T.A.G.S. This thrilling page-turner about the dark side of wealth and privilege has been one of the most popular reads in the Library this year so it was fascinating to get an insight into the genesis of the book. Students were also excited to hear that S.T.A.G.S. is being adapted into a movie; we can't wait!
