First Lego League National Final Competition

On Saturday 26 February, a team of ten Beaumont students went to the First Lego League national final competition in Harrogate. The competition entailed coding a robot to complete Lego challenges and creating a solution to a given problem (this year's problem being to improve cargo transport).

The day before, we left school early in a minibus and, after six hours, got to Harrogate. We then went to an Italian restaurant before arriving at the Youth Hostel, completing some final robot runs and going to bed. When we arrived at the competition, we were shown our 'pit' area, the judging booths and the robot tables. The day started with an opening ceremony and shortly after we had our judging session for the innovation project, where we presented our idea to make cargo transportation better. Our idea was E-Trainsit - a train which puts down its own tracks to deliver resources to communities in third world countries, while cutting emissions and costs. The judges thought our idea was well researched and presented. They also enjoyed our jingle and matching hoodies.

Throughout the day, we practised our robot runs. However, during the six-hour journey to Harrogate, the robot was knocked and couldn't travel in a straight line at the start of the day. Eventually, through lots of trial and error, we were able to get the robot back up and running and completed most of the challenges we wanted to. Our top score was 240 points, placing us just outside of the top 10.


During the competition, there were many fun challenges to complete, such as contributing to a lego graffiti wall, designing a placard, a photobooth and decorating a box as a cargo crate. These all gave as extra points and something to do for the members of the team that were less involved in the robot. Two of the hosts of the competition also interviewed us during a live stream.

During the awards ceremony, we received the first award to be given out which was elected by the president of the IET (Institution for Engineering and Technology) and was for the cargo crate challenge. This was one of the fun extra challenges completed during the day and we won a box of Lego for it.

Overall, the day was incredible and the atmosphere and support surrounding us was amazing: from the teachers who brought us there, to all the volunteers, and everyone watching the live stream at home.

The last couple of months have been a busy and productive period for the Board of Trustees. Following a robust external recruitment process, we were pleased to coopt three new Trustees — Matt Maltz, Ekaterina Sjostrand, and Ian Winter — to the Board, all of whom will bring a wealth of professional skill and experience to governance at Beaumont. Continuing on the theme of Trustee recruitment, we will shortly be looking to recruit two Parent Trustees to the Board and, at the time of writing, arrangements are being put in place for the required election.

We were also sad to say goodbye to our Clerk for the past few years, Sharon Banks, and very grateful for her hard work for the school. We are delighted that Julie Wells has agreed to take on the mantle of Company Secretary/Governance Professional.

On Thursday 24 February, Trustees and Members met at the school for our annual Strategy Day. In the morning, the new Trustees toured the school with Mr Atkinson and me, whilst other Trustees attended lessons in various subjects, as part of our ongoing monitoring of student and teacher experience. In the afternoon, we received an excellent presentation from the student Sustainability Team, which gave us plenty of food for thought for our extended strategy meeting, which followed.

One of the core functions of a governing body is to ensure clarity of vision for the school, and that was the main theme of the strategy meeting. Following the presentation on sustainability, the Trustees and Members unanimously agreed to join the National Governance Association's Greener Governance campaign, and we nominated a Trustee to join students and staff on the school's new Environmental Sustainability Committee.

We also discussed self-assessment of the Board's own skills and reviewed the school's self-evaluation documentation; and we were joined by the Leadership Team for consideration of key strategic questions and challenges that the school faces as we emerge from nearly two years of pandemic.

It was a very useful discussion and will feed into the school's plan for school improvement in the coming year.

Reach out for Refugees

On Monday 21 March, Beaumont School took part in a 'Reach out for Refugees' day alongside about 50 schools in Hertfordshire. Students and staff alike were asked to wear something blue and yellow. These are the colours of Ukraine but also of Hertfordshire. The idea started when two students, Sherri and Joshua, from Skyswood School, saw what was happening in Ukraine and knew they wanted to do something to help. They wanted to 'Unite for Ukraine' and then decided that it should be a day to 'Reach out for Refugees' because Ukraine is not the only country from which refugees are fleeing. The schools wanted it to be an inclusive event which supported all refugees.



As a Hertfordshire schools' campaign, it seemed appropriate to support a local charity 'Herts for Refugees' which has a strong record of helping those people most in need. They have already sent thousands of pounds to organisations operating on the ground in neighbouring countries of Poland and Moldova who are providing hot meals to those who have often waited in long queues after difficult journeys.

Money has also been sent to support the transportation of vital medical supplies to Ukraine. The campaign has so far raised nearly £11,000 in a day.

Writer Jonathan Stroud lights up World Book Day

WBD 2022 will live long in the memory as the day Jonathan Stroud, author of *The Outlaws Scarlett and Browne*, visited Beaumont to celebrate his book's triumph as our whole school read (WSR) 2021/22. Since we unveiled this 'futuristic British Western' as our WSR back in October, Jonathan's exhilarating adventure story has gripped and delighted Beaumont students and staff across the school.

During his visit, Jonathan spoke to students in the hall about his life as a writer and the ideas that led to *Scarlett and Browne*. He is currently putting the finishing touches to the book's sequel and treated us to a reading from the opening chapter of the story. We were so thrilled to get a sneak preview of *The Notorious Scarlett and Browne!* Isadora in Year 10 told us: 'I really enjoyed Jonathan's talk about his creative processes and his new book. It really inspired me and made me excited to read more of his work.'

We are very grateful to Jonathan for all the time he spent listening and talking to students, signing their books and browsing the reviews, artwork, bookmarks and book covers they have created through a range of cross-curricular *Scarlett and Browne* activities.

This book has been a superb whole school read. It's brilliantly written, contains a cast of unforgettable characters and has a rollercoaster of a plot. What's more, the book highlights important issues such as climate catastrophe and neurodiversity, providing excellent material for discussion in English lessons and lunchtime book clubs.

The movie world has also recognised the calibre of *The Outlaws Scarlett and Browne* with the book set to be made into a film with *Bridgerton* star Phoebe Dynevor in the title role. Exciting movie news but always remember: it was a Beaumont WSR first!
