Students representing Years 7-10 recently held a meeting with the Area Manager of the catering company Chartwells, to pass on student opinions on the provision of food and refreshments at Beaumont. Year 8 student Leo Samuel has written a summary of their meeting.

Lunchtime is one of the most important parts of the day, and Beaumont, along with the school's catering company, allowed for a handful of students to say what they like and dislike about school food and, most importantly, how school food could be improved. We discussed making the food available to more and more students by offering a larger variety of vegetarian options. Recently, the school trialled meat-free Monday, where there was a much larger assortment of food for those who do not eat meat. We talked about the positives and negatives of this day and, if it was to happen every week, how it could be even better. We also spoke about serving halal meat, gluten free food and healthier options.

Another thing that was raised was how food is packaged and how packaging could be made more environmentally friendly by switching to paper and card alternatives. Oh and how could I forget, we tasted some food that could be added to the menu like a delicious vegetable biryani, potato wedges and a halloumi bun. The food was very nice and overall it was great being able to get my opinion heard and all my questions answered.

A trio of book awards to get us talking

Beaumont students have the opportunity to get involved with three national book awards over the summer term:

<u>The Children's Book Award</u> (CBA): coordinated by the Federation of Children's Book Groups, which is the only national award voted for solely by children from start to finish.

The Jhalak Children's and YA Prize: this prize celebrates books written by British people of colour.

<u>The Yoto Carnegie Medal</u>: this is the UK's longest running children's book prize and is considered by many to be the most prestigious. It is awarded by children's librarians but the young people who take part in or 'shadow' the award also get the chance to vote on which of the shortlisted books they want to win the <u>Shadowers' Choice Award</u>.







Students can choose which of the shortlists they'd like to follow. Whichever book prize they pick, we'll be running discussion and activity groups in the Library in the weeks ahead. These sessions are always lively and, more often than not, the book chat is accompanied by biscuits and cake!

Book award shortlists showcase the very best of children's and young adult fiction. They are an ideal way to generate interest in reading, to raise talking points and to encourage readers to try books they wouldn't normally choose. If students are interested in taking part in any of these book prizes, they can pop into the Library and speak to the librarians.
