

Thank you to the businesses and education, training and apprenticeship providers who contributed, especially the emergency crews, many of whom gave up their rest days to join us.












H'arts in Mind




From the Board of Trustees

Sixth Form trip to the US Embassy





Teams were allocated a total of 15 minutes to present their debate and it was recommended that both the Proposer and Opposer speak for five minutes, with the Chairperson taking up the remaining five minutes for the introductions and summing up. 
