



How to Revise Effectively



Before you begin ...

- √ Find a suitable place to work which is peaceful.
- Ensure you have all the equipment you need at the start.
- Ensure you don't have distractions, put your phone out of the room.
- Revise in 45 minute blocks then have a 15 minute break.

1) Recalling Information (Retrieval Practice)


- X Don't just re-read information
- X Don't just highlight your notes



1) Recalling Information (Retrieval Practice)


- ✓ Summarise the information you need to learn.
- Read your revision notes, cover them up and set a ten minute timer and write down as much as you can about the topic.
- ✓ Do use quizzes and the help from other people to test your knowledge and memory.







2) Dual Coding


- Do use dual coding when you have text heavy notes that could be represented visually.
- Do try to come up with a variety of different ways to represent information visually, e.g. timelines, diagrams, flow diagrams, cartoon strips, etc.
- Do remember to try and recall these diagrams during retrieval practice.

High levels of stress




Trait Theory

There is a lot of contradictory evidence to this theory.







3) Spacing and Interleaving

✓ Do create a revision table where each subject or topic is spaced out. Each time you return to the topic, you will remember more and more.

Do interleave 2-3 subjects in a day or week.





So, in summary.....

- ✓ Retrieval is the key make your brain work and then it will remember the knowledge.
- ✓ Test yourself and get others to test you make your brain work and then it will remember the knowledge.
- Change text into a range of diagrams make your brain think.
- ✓ Plan ahead so you can space out revision for each subject and you can revise a few subjects each day.

Example A level combinations (Science based)

- Biology; Chemistry; Maths; Physics; Further Maths; Computer Science
- Economics; Geography; Maths; Psychology
- P.E.; Psychology; Biology

Note: Further Maths can only be taken with at least 3 other A levels

Example A level combinations (Arts based)

- Art; Photography; Dance; Drama; Music
- English; French; Geography; German; History; Philosophy & Ethics; Politics; Psychology; Sociology; Spanish;
- Business Economics; Media Studies; Photography; Product Design
- Red = Consortium only

Example 'classic' combinations


- English Literature; Drama; Music
- Economics; Maths; History
- Psychology; Business Economics; Geography
- Philosophy & Ethics; English Literature; Politics
- * BTEC Media, Photography, Sociology

Some Example University Guidance

- Computing: Maths (some will require Further Maths as well)
- **Economics**: Maths (course specific but generally required)
- **Engineering**: Maths + Physics
- Law: typically one or more of History, English, Politics, Philosophy & Ethics
- **Theatre Studies**: Drama + English
- **❖ Medical Science**: Chemistry + Biology

We are not aware of any courses which specify more than 2 essential subjects.

Entry criteria - Beaumont Sixth Form

- Average point score of between 4 5: C-TECH/BTEC blend
- Average point score of 5 and above: 3 A-levels (except hard sciences) with a 6 in the subjects you want to study* (except Maths = 7, Further Maths = advise an 8)
- Average point score of 6 and above: 3 A-levels incl. Sciences (to study Biology or Chemistry requires a 6 in Maths, Physics needs Maths)
- Average point score of 7 and above: 4 A-levels possible
- * English and/or Maths GCSEs at 6 and above are often the entry criteria for subjects which have not previously been studied.

Entry criteria - Average point score

- Average point score is calculated by adding up the results of all GCSE/BTEC's taken and dividing by the number of examinations taken.
- Eg a student who takes: Maths, Eng lang, Eng Lit, Double Science (counts as 2 GCSE and get two grades) French, Geog, Hist, PE and Computer Science. Has taken 10 GCSE so adds up all their results and divides by 10. If a student has dropped a subject due to exceptional circumstances then their overall total would be divided by the number if GCSEs they sat.

If applying to Beaumont Sixth Form

- As an 'Internal student' all applications go to Mrs Powdrell- Deadline is Friday February 2nd 2024
- Offers will be made subject to the grades you achieved in your mock exams
- Offer letters will be sent out before Easter Holidays
- You must confirm your offer with the sixth form office
- In the summer term you are transferred to the sixth form team for all further communication regarding study in the sixth form.
- Attendance at Sixth Form Conference is compulsory.
